Summer Reading English II Honors

Novels: *Lord of the Flies* – William Golding and *Old Man and the Sea* – Ernest Hemingway

In order to be prepared for the fun adventures of English and to reinforce important concepts and analytical skills, you will be reading two novels – William Golding's *Lord of the Flies* and Ernest Hemingway's *Old Man and the Sea*.

Remember that your reading assignment should be completed and posted into your Google Classroom **prior to the first day of school. This counts as the first **test grade** of the year. When you return to school you will have an in-class written assignment on *Old Man and the Sea* to check your understanding of that novel.

As you read the novel you will keep a journal that shows how you are interacting with the text. This journal should be posted into the GoogleDoc template that you will have in your Google Classroom. Assignment is due BEFORE the first day of school.

Instructions:

- For every **chapter** of reading (there are **12 total**), you will write a journal entry between **7-10 sentences**. You will choose a direct quote/passage from the text and write about its overall significance, deeper meaning, and/or how you relate to it. (Your passage does not count as part of your sentences)
- You should have a **total of 12** journal entries
- Ideas you may choose to include:
 - Literary Analysis
 - *Metaphors, allegory, similes, allusions, morals etc.
- Ideas for experiences you may choose to relate:
 - Memories
 - Other works/pop-culture
 - o Real-life scenarios
 - Ethical/ social dilemmas

** Your entry should have:

- 1. A date
- 2. A citation/passage that is part of a quote sandwich.
- 3. Make sure you are introducing the quote AND explaining its significance.
- 4. An analytical response of 7 to 10 sentences
- 5. Writing should be in MLA format (Times New Roman, 12 pt font, double spaced).

Sample Response:

As the story progresses, we see the difficulty that some of the characters have in accepting the situation that they are in. It is as though they need to choose between their basic humanity and the animalistic instinct that is triggered when faced with the need to survive. Hunting, death and struggle become the norm in which they all find themselves. Some of the boys take things to an extreme. At one point we see Jack donning a mask which "was a thing on its own, behind which [he] hid, liberated from shame and self-consciousness" (Golding 64). It is wild how much people are willing to do and say when they hide behind a facade. We see it in life today: People killing others in the name of their religions, their political agendas and mass hysteria that takes over an entire group of people. When Jack hides his face, he ultimately hides his humanity which leads to a newfound sense of freedom. It isn't the freedom to live to his utmost potential as a human being so much as the freedom to do barbaric things and not live with the shame and regret that encompasses such evil deeds.
